## Big Scout Meeting Held at Shelby

Shelby, Dec. 10th—The Executive Board of the Piedmont Council of the Boy Scouts of America held the biggest meeting in its history of the past 17 years, in attendance of men from the counties of Alexander, Burke, Caldwell, Catawba, Cleveland, Gaston, Iredell, Lincoln, McDowell, Polk and Rutherford. Reports were received on an organization and extension program which is believed by the officials of the Council to be the most comprehensive program of its kind attempted by the organization in an effort to serve an increasing number of boys. The program includes a boy-fact survey which was recently made in the eleven counties of the Council with the help and cooperation of the schools of the area. The information gained through the survey reveals that thousands of boys are desirous of being Cubs and Scouts. From the information obtained in the survey, the various County and Community districts of the Council will launch an intensive campaign to enlist the churches and other institutions to sponsor needed Cub Packs and Scout Troops. In addition, every Troop and Pack has been asked to enroll up to its maximum strength.

Reports were received from the Commissioner Service showing that the Troop and Pack Inventory and Roll Call of the 159 Troops and 10 Cub Packs has been almost completed and that the various units in the Council are training for emergency service

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
