Kiwanians Hear State Conservation Official

E. B. Garrett, of the State Department of Conservation, Raleigh, was the guest speaker at the Tryon Kiwanis club on Tuesday at 1 p. m., at Hotel Tryon. Program was in charge of P. L. Barnette. Mr. Garrett told of the urgent need to control soil erosion, by planting forests, lespedeza and other soil saving crops. He said we need to plant ten times the amount of lespedeza we are now growing, and that we should learn how to use it economically. Loss of soil by erosion is associated with human suffering, pover-ty, crime and disease. We must save our soil in order to grow crops that will produce an income to feed and clothe our people. He said 30 large reservoir lakes had been rendered useless by being filled with silt washed from the farm lands.
