A&P Introduces "Enriched" Bread As Defense Help

In response to the National Research's much - discussed recommendations for new white bread nutrition standards, the Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Co., today announced a new white loaf, enriched with Vitamin (B1) and other mineral factors to the nutritional level of whole wheat bread.

M. A. Hogewood, vice-president of the food chain's Southern Division, said the action "is in line with intensified government interest in making these essential food elements more widely available on the national defense effort's civilian front."

The new loaf will be available in A&P stores throughout this area at the same price as the old loaf, the food official said.

Each pound of the company's "Marvel" bread, Mr. Hogewood explained, will contain 450 International Units of the "moralebuilding" vitamin generally known as (B1) and added quantities of iron and the pellagra-preventive vitamin. Use of a large proportion of milk also provides calcium and riboflavin-Vitamin (B2)-which are essential to normal growth. These vitamin and mineral additions not only meet standards proposed by the National Research Council's Committee on food and nutritional needs, but makes this white bread the equal of average whole wheat bread in these vitamin and mineral factors, he said.

Heretofore much of the vitamin and mineral value of wheat has been lost in the milling process CONTINUED ON BACK PAGE
