Wilkins with 259. The defeated candidates also received a large vote. R. O. Andrews received 255 and W. A. Wilson 211 votes, Interest in the election was keen and workers for the various candidates were busy all day. On the firt election count R. O. Andrews was in with 258 votes and W. Y. Wilkins out with 257. A re-count put Wilkins in with 259. A total of 487 people voted.
