1,200 Attend Picnic Of Federation

Columbus, July 15.—An all-day rain did not daunt the crowd of more than 1,200 persons who attended the annual Farmers' federation Polk County picnic at the courthouse here Tuesday. The meeting was one of the largest ever held here.

James G. K. McClure, president of the federation, told the assembled farm families that the federation is the only cooperative which places its main emphasis on quality and obtaining markets of farm

produce.

"The Farmers' federation," he said "is trying to increase and build up income on every farm in this county. It is constantly working to develop programs which will improve the farms of Polk County.
