Polk Sailor at Sea Encounters Friend, But Misses Brother

A. B. seaman Avery Lee Edwards, Polk County sailor in the Maritime service, who was recently cited for bravery by the Maritime Commission for heroism in saving the lives of two men, has had some more unusual experiences. Last week while helping transport some soldiers to Iceland he accidentally bumped into one of the passengers and when he turned to apologize discovered an old friend and classmate in Private Harlan McIntire of Columbus who is now in the Army occupying Iceland. Seaman Edwards was not so fortunate some months ago when he helped transport some soldiers to Trinidad, British West Indies. His brother, Private Ruel Edwards was on board ship and neither knew of it.
