## Football Friday; Tryon High Vs. Inman High

The 1941 Tryon high football team under coach Ed Beach, a former University of Oregon end, will get under way with a game with Inman high on Friday, Sept. 19th, at Harmon Field. The local team with over half of their stars of last year gone is busily grooming new men for the vacant positions. The backfield with Ed Beatson, Jack Melton and Robert Andrews has been supplemented by Durham and Baker. The line is being built around Locke McGeachy, Wall, and Arledge. New faces that will see service this year are Bishop, Moore, Cox, Marvin Edwards, Marion Edwards, Capps, Tom Melton, Bridgeman and a few others.

The Tryon squad will present a fast attack with an entirely new form of offense which should be interesting for the spectators to watch. The only indication of the potential strength of the team is the result of a scrimmage with Hendersonville eleven on Tuesday. Both teams were about equal, with the Hendersonville bunch scoring one touchdown, and the Tryon boys losing a score by having a pass slip through one of the end's fingers while standing over the goal line.

The Inman team has been on the local schedule for about fifteen years and have furnished the opening date for the past three years. Their teams play hard, clean ball, with good coaching and sportsmanship. All this points to an interesting afternoon on Harmon Field. The game will start promptly at 3:30 DST.
