## Sheriff Hines Warn Public About Safety of Tires

Sheriff W. D. Hines issued a warning today to motorists to take caution as to the safety of the tires they have on hand now.

The sheriff stated that after January 5th, when tire rationing goes into effect, theft of tires would be prevalent.

Mr. Hines pointed out the following precautions:

Watch locks on spares.

Take serial numbers of each tire you have. In this way you can identify your tires if they are stolen.

If possible, carry only one spare

tire at a time.

Don't park in dark alleys.

Do not park your car in a place where a thief could easily take your tires.

Securely lock your tires when

not in use.

Mr. Hines further stated that if you buy tires from an indiviual to be sure they have not been tolen. He added, "know from whom you get your tires."
