## RED CROSS WORK ROOM REPORT

The Women of Tryon, don't let your war efforts dwindle! The attendance at the Red Cross Work Room needs stepping up, and enough materials and yarn have come in to keep us busy. In order to conserve fuel and electricity the work will still be concentrated on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, but there is need for more workers, both on simple basting and on machine work and on knitting. There are boys' shirts and convalescent robes in process of making, and the following total of garments has already been completed since the Red Cross Work Room opened on January 12th, 1942:

Sewing: 64 pairs children's pajamas; 41 women's night gowns; 80 bed jackets; 42 baby garments.

Knitting: 14 child's caps and hats; 2 mufflers; 20 pairs men's socks; 11 child's suits; 19 sweaters.
