SUGAR RATIONING SOON IN EFFECT IN POLK

Sugar requirements for the following people: Merchants, wholesale and retail, cafes, hotels, boarding houses, school lunch rooms, inns, lodges, drug stores, bakeries, candy and cake manufacturers (for sale), dairies, ice cream manufacturers, hospitals, county homes, jails, and any and all other institutions using sugar for the purpose of resale in any form, will register, Tuesday and Wednesday, April 28th, and 29th. Registrations to be held at the nearest white school building between 10 a. m. and 5 p. m. This registration is mandatory and is not optional and those failing to register as prescribed above will be penalized.

Registrations must be made by the owner or his designated manager. In case of purchase of sugar for resale the merchant must submit the following information: (a) gross sales of all meats, groceries, fruits and vegetables, etc., the week ending April 25, 1942; (b) sugar delivered to and accepted by registering unit during month of November 1941; (c) present inventory of sugar in pounds.

Institutional and industrial users, such as hostels, cafes, ice cream manufacturers and those others listed above should be prepared to give their monthly consumption of sugar for each month of 1941, and for March 1942, in order to secure permits to purchase sugar for their needs.

Everyone, please take note, that these regulations apply only to industrial business, institutions enumerated above. The civilian
