The letters stand for "United Service Organizations," which include The Young Men's Christian Association, the National Catholic Community Service, the Salvation Army, the Young Women's Christian Association, the Jewish Welfare Board and the National Traveler's Association. With the approval and cooperation of the United States Government, gether with the Army and the Navy, the U. S. O. operates an extensive and carefully prepared program for the welfare and morale of our soldiers and sailors. Up to December 1, 1941, the USO had expended \$6,559,780.00. By the end of May, all of the money contributed last June will be used up. To finance the project until March 31, 1943, will require about \$11,000,000.00.

A nation-wide appeal for this sum will be made. The quota suggested for Tryon is \$990, of which sum, \$90 will be expended for the entertainment of soldiers here.
