Mail must be deposited in the letter drop not later than 8:40 p. m. The patrons of this office will find this much to their advantage as mail for the west will make the same connections as if mailed on Train No. 10. Mail for the North will leave Spartanburg, S. C., at 12:59 a. m., arriving in Washington, D. C., the next morning at 11:30.

This service includes all first class mail, air mail, special delivery packages, daily papers. Not ordinary parcel post.

The lobby of the post office will be open until 8:50 p. m., daily.
