SOLDIER FROM CAMP CROFT IS DROWNED

Private Harold Hileman, 21, of Camp Croft, near Spartanburg, drowned in Lake Lanier Saturday afternoon about 1 o'clock.

Two companions, Privates William F. O'Hara and Humbert Betti, said that Hileman, a native of New Kensington, Pa., dived in the lake and failed to come up. The body was recovered an hour and a half later. Boy Scouts and others assisted in recovering the body which was in water 18 feet deep. The body was recovered with the aid of grappling hooks.

Tryon physicians, who were present when the body was brought from the water, tried to revive the man.

After Hileman failed to come to the surface after diving into the water, fear was expressed that he had become entangled in something. Later, however, this theory was not held as Hileman had been seen in a bathing suit and nothing was seen that would indicate he had been trapped at the bottom of the lake.

Camp Croft officials came for the body soon after it was recovered and took it to the camp in an army ambulance.

Fishing Season Opens Here Wednesday

Game Warden Arthur Pack announces that the fishing season for all fish opens on Wednesday, June 10th. As Wednesday is a half-holiday for Spartanburg and Tryon merchants, a number of fishing holes are expected to be occupied on that day. Warden Pack states that the non-resident fishing fee is \$5.10 for the season; \$1.10 for daily permit. Resident state license is \$2.10; or 60 daily permit. For Polk County people who will fish only in Polk County the fee is \$1.10 per season.
