Victory Observance on 4th

Raleigh, N. C., June 11.—Victory Day celebration in each of the 100 counties of North Carolina is the goal of the State Office of Civilian Defense.

Ben Douglas, State OCD director, said today that in accordance with Governor Broughton's proclamation of the Fourth of July as VICTORY DAY, he was urging chairmen of Civilian Defense in all 100 counties to proceed immediately with the organization of suitable VICTORY DAY programs which would bring about a demonstration of the scope of the volunteers organized for home front defense.

"I regard as most fortunate this opportunity to combine patriotic celebration of the birthdate of our independence with recognition of the vast army enlisted in home front protection and of parents of men and women now on duty with our armed services," said Douglas in announcing that in a number of places the Civilian Defense organization was planning a parade on the morning of the Fourth of July immediately preceding Town Meetings and the meetings would be followed by picnics or barbecues.

Douglas said the idea was popular because of limitations on travel that would prevent many people from making customary Fourth of July excursions and would give them something to do at home.

The American Legion and other patriotic and civic organizations will join the Civilian Defense organization in participation. The observance in different counties will be fitted to local conditions rather than to a uniform program for the entire state.
