Weather Tuesday: low 62; high 88; rain .19 . . . . George Brannon who is visiting in Detroit, has been offered a lieutenant junior grade commission in the Navy . . . The old Howard Hotel in Saluda has been renamed Mountain Manor and is being operated by Mrs. Henry M. Needham of Fort Myers, Fla. . . . St. Luke's hospital is in need of thermos water pitchers for use of patients during the hot summer months. Thermos pitchers will hold ice water for a long time. Please look on your shelves and see what you can give to the hospital. These pitchers can't be bought now, and suffering patients will be most grateful . . . The rationing board spent \$52.38 last month as follows: \$4.73 for print-  
\$11.30 to Calhoun Office sup-  
plies, \$36.29 for stamps. The money to pay these bills was raised by voluntary subscriptions. In most places the town and county governments give the money, but here, it is up to the people. Chairman C. J. Lynch of the Defense Council says the rationing board is out of money. Unfortunately the government doesn't grant franking privileges to the board and they have to use stamps in correspondence. But Board Chairman Dudley Smith says that the use of stamps is cheaper and saves gasoline and tires by not making trips in person . . . The stores in Columbus close Thursday afternoons instead of Tuesday . .
