## SPICED FIGS

Copied from a postal that Dr. L. G. Bedell wrote August 27th, 1913, to Mrs. Henry Acker.

"Make a syrup of 5 pounds of sugar and a pint of the best vinegar for each 7 pounds of figs. Put the figs in the syrup and let them boil until they are like preserves. Make about 4 little cheese-cloth bags and put in each bag 6 or 7 cloves; several small pieces of cinnamon, and a little mace. Put these spices in at the start and boil with the figs. Take out the figs when done and put in jars (also the spice bags), boil down the syrup and pour it over them when thick and rich."
