These two Legionnaires found they had many friends in common. In reminiscing, Capt. Bryan mentioned the name of Col. Burkhead, who is also a Tryonite. Reich immediately recalled Col. Burkhead, who as a captain, was his commanding officer overseas.

The following day, while downtown with his father, Reich met Coll. Burkhead in person and recognized him at once. Col. Burkhead, Capt. Bryant and Private Reich had quite a reunion, talking over old times and recalling many war-time incidents when they soldiered together in Toul, France.
