## FUEL OIL AND KEROSENE RATIONING

Notice: If you use fuel oil or kerosene to heat your home or for domestic hot water, you must complete your application for this year's supply on or before Oct. 31.

If you have not received an application form from your fuel oil dealer, get one from the Ration Board office immediately. Read it very carefully and fill it out.

You should have accurate information on the following:

1. The number of persons regularly living in the house (day help not included).

2. The sizes of all rooms used for living purposes, eating, sleeping, or working, together with the sizes of the closets and halls opening onto such rooms. No allowances will be made for basement space, sun or sleeping porches, storage space, garage or laundry, or any space for which heating is not essential. The sizes of rooms should be the length and width only. If a room is not a perfect rectangle, divide it in sections and give the size of each section.

3. Amount of fuel oil or kerosene on hand October 1st, and amounts purchased since that date. Also the capacity of your storage tank.

4. Get a certificate from your fuel oil dealer on the amount of fuel oil or kerosene you used last year.

A member of the Fuel Oil Rationing committee will be at the Ration Board office from 10 a. m., to 1 p. m., on October 29th, 30, and 31, to help you complete your application. Polk Co. War Price & Rationing Board, Jerry D. Drew, Chm. Fuel Oil Committee.
