## Tire and Tube Quota For November

New passenger tires, 4; grade II tires, 7; recapped passenger tires, 61; passenger tubes, 8; new truck tires, 11; new truck tubes, 1; recapped truck tires, 19.

"With regard to our new truck tires, there appears to be no relief in sight. Operators are cautioned against continuing to use tires that have reached the recap stage. It is much better to lay up trucks for a few days in order to recap a tire rather than run the risk of ruining the carcass, and thus make themselves ineligible for new tires."

While the number of passenger recaps is an increase over previous quotas, the November quota will only permit the Board to take care of the estimated eligible applications to prevent the running of carcasses past the recapping stage. Following is a list of those eligible to make application for tires:

Passenger cars—(A-a) Doctors, Nurses, Vets.

(A-b) Ministers.

(A-b-3) Police.

(A-d-5) Rural mail carriers.

(B-a-1) Taxis.

(B-a-2) Highwain maintenance.

(B-a-3) Transportation of defense workers.

B-a-4) Official government business. (This classification includes county agents, home agents, sanitarian for health department, and so forth).

Trucks and buses—(A-c) Ambulances.

(A-d-1) Fire.

(A-d-4) Sanitation, garbage,
