Point Free-IF . .

Since it is now hog-killing time over most of the south, OPA has again repeated the regulations under which a farmer may use the meat which he owns, after it is slaughtered, without exchanging rationing points.

Meat produced by a farmer who lives on his farm can, of course, be consumed by members of his household, point free.

If a person who operates a farm but does not live on it, may still receive the meat for consumption by his household point free if: 1. He supervised the raising of

that meat by visiting the farm at least one-third of the days the animals were being raised, or 2. He purchased the animal at

least 60 days before slaughter and visited the farm at least one-third of the days during this period to supervise the raising of the animal.
