

## Child Killed In Accident

A young boy by name of Garrett of Mill Spring section, was killed Sunday afternoon when the truck in which he was riding hit an embankment. Leroy Walker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Milo Walker, and recently returned from overseas service, was driving the truck and is in Columbus jail charged with reckless driving. Two other occupants of the truck Misses Martha and Virginia Walker, ages 11 and seven, are in St. Luke's hospital for treatment of injuries.
