The following is a copy of letter just received from Mrs. Cora D. Wolfe, Administrator Volunteer Special Services, American Red Cross, Southeastern Area:

"We have just been advised by national headquarters that heavy demands from hospitals abroad and from hospital ships, have seriously depleted the stock of bedroom slippers.

"It is necessary that we build up both national and area stocks if we are to meet current needs for slippers.

"Will you let us know at once when we may expect shipment of all or part of the quota of 500 pairs which your chapter accepted in May."
