A donation from Robert Limbert brought the Polk County 4-H Club Foundation one calf nearer its goal of 25 a few days ago. It takes about \$100 to buy a purebred calf. The goal of the local Foundation is to have 25 purebred calves in the hands of 25 4-H club boys who will raise them, milk them and save an offspring from each calf to give to other 4-H club boys, thereby creating a chain of good deeds. When the boys give one calf to another 4-H club boy they discharge their debt to the Foundation. Each boy who receives a calf free has to give a calf; and the chain will run on indefinitely and increase the wealth of the whole county.
