## Duke Industrialist Speaker At Kiwanis Tuesday

John W. Fox, industrial engineer of the Duke Power Co., of Charlotte, will be the guest speaker at the Tryon Kiwanis club on Tuesday at 1 p. m. at Oak Hall hotel K. A. Bowen will be in charge of the program. The Duke Power Co. has just announced its plans to spend over four million dollars to enlarge its big power plant at Cliffside in order to provide adequate current for the many industries expected in the Piedmont area. Mr. Fox is an advocate of using your own natural resources and developing them on a small scale instead of trying to bring a big mill in from the outside. Governor Cherry recently appointed Senator Carroll P. Rogers of Tryon to serve on a committee designated to promote the natural resources of the rural areas in North Carolina in order to have a more balanced state.
