E. T. H. Shaffer Passes

Walterboro, S. C., Nov. 28 — Edward Terry Hendrie (Bobbie) Shaffer, South Carolina author who contributed to many magazines, died at his home, Rose Hill, in Walterboro this morning. His summer residence was in Saluda, N. C. Funeral arrangements are incomplete.

Mr. Shaffer was author of "Carolina Gardens," book review editor of the South Carolina Magazine, and contributor to The Atlantic Monthly, Forum, the Yale Review, National Geographic, Spur, Fortune, Nature Magazine, Textiles, South Atlantic Quarterly and other magazines.

He was the son of A. Casper Shaffer and Mrs. Amelia Jane Terry Shaffer of Walterboro, originally from New Jersey. He was born in Walterboro, attended local schools and graduated from the College of Charleston.

Mr. Shaffer was a trustee of the College of Charleston, an elder in Bethel Presbyterian church in Walterboro, for many years superintendent of the church's Sunday school; member of the Lions club, the Masons, and a director of the South Carolina Power company.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Clara Speights Barr Shaffer, formerly of Greenville; a son, Edward T. H., Jr., captain with Pan-American Airways in Guatemala; a daughter, Mrs. J. Blanding Holman of Batesburg, and five grandchildren. A foster sister, Mrs. S. E. Boney, lives in Syracuse, N. Y.
