## Noted Diplomat Speaker For Kiwanis Tuesday

Alexander Vincent Dye, retired diplomat, who recently moved to Tryon to make his home, will be the guest speaker at the Tryon Kiwanis club Tuesday at 1 p. m. at Oak Hall. J. Frank Gallimore will be in charge of the program.

Dr. Dye is a graduate of William Jewell College. He received his Ph.D. from Leipzig, Germany; was professor of modern languages at William Jewell (1904-1909); American consul at Nogales, Mexico (1909-1913); special assistant to U. S. Dept. of State and representative of War Trade Board, Norway (1907-19); International Corp., (1919-21); U. S. Trade commissioner, London, (1921-23); Commercial attache, Mexico City, (1923-26); Buenos Aires, (1926-35); Director Bureau of Foreign and Domestic commerce, Washington, D. C. (1936-39); Commercial attache, London (1939-41); retired from foreign service, March 1941; Economic consultant National Foreign Trade Reconstruction since 1941; Executive Director Foreign Trade Reconstruction; Director of a study of ocean-home commerce; Adviser at International meetings at Buenos Aires, 1932, and 1935; Montevideo, 1933; Lima, 1938; Tampa, Fla., 1939. He was decorated with the Order of St. Olav by Norway in 1919 and has received other honors from European and American organizations. He is building a home in Gillette Woods.

## Several Hundred At Freezer Locker Opening

"Nothing could mean so much in the life of the citizens of a community as the opening of a frozen food locker plant," Miss Nita Orr, frozen food expert of Bristol, Tenn., declared Saturday before several hundred patrons assembled to see the opening of a new locker and warehouse of the Farmers Federation at Tryon.

The locker plant, scheduled to open earlier, burned before its completion two months ago. Rebuilding of the locker plant and warehouse was rushed to accommodate the people who had raised hogs and cattle especially for locker storage.

Miss Orr explained that through the use of frozen food facilities it will be possible to have fresh strawberries and other foods at any time of the year.

"By use of the new pressure sauce pans the cooking time for preparation of foods for locker storage is cut to a minimum," Miss Orr said.

Miss Orr gave general rules for good freezer storage of foods. She recommended that patrons continue to put in and take out their foods, providing "turnover" of the foods in the lockers every several months.

Mert Austin, superintendent of Farmers Federation frozen food locker plants in Asheville, Hendersonville, Waynesville and Tryon, demonstrated the packages used for proper preparation of foods for freezer storage.
