

David Low, the New Zealand-born cartoonist, created "Colonel Blimp" somewhere about 1930, and that now famous person has appeared in Lord Beaverbrook's London Standard ever since.

The picture which will be shown at the Tryon Theater at 9 o'clock on Tuesday night, Dec. 13th, tells how Colonel Blimp won the Victoria Cross in the South African war, and sees him through all subsequent wars. Each time war gets less glamorous, and the satire on army life and martial glory more pungent. All the proceeds of the Tryon showing of Colonel Blimp will go, through the United War Fund, to the relief of starving, homeless people in Europe.

Tickets will be on sale on Tuesday morning, Dec. 4, at Missildine's, Owen's and the Tryon Theatre. Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts will also sell tickets. There will be 102 reserved seats at \$1.20 each; 304 seats at 60c, and 150 seats in the gallery, reserved for colored people, at 35c each.
