"Every town in North Carolina should have some kind of a planning and zoning agency to cope with traffic bottlenecks and map future orderly development in the motor age," Coleman W. Roberts, President of the Carolina Motor Club, said in Charlotte Monday.

He said many states require that buildings be erected sufficiently back from highways to preserve natural beauty of the area. Business buildings are required to provide ingress roads which do not interfere with fast highway traffic.

It is a responsibility of public officials to provide off-street parking facilities when private enterprise fails, Roberts said. "Every time parking is eliminated on both sides of any congested street, it is equivalent to widening that street 16 feet, and without cost to anybody."

Roberts recently observed traffic and planning conditions on a trip to the western states.—Charlotte Observer.
