PROBE OF ELECTION IRREGULARITIES WILL REQUIRE TIME

Washington, Dec. 18.—Charges of irregularities in the use of absentee ballots in the Polk County sheriff's election are being thoroughly investigated by the Department of Justice, but there will be considerable delay before any action is taken on them.

Assistant Attorney General T. Lamar Caudle, chief of the criminal division, said this afternoon the Department was not in a position to disclose details of the investigation of charges brought by Claude Y. Nanney, Jr., of Union Mills, Republican defeated by veteran Rep. A. L. Bulwinkle of Gastonia.

Nanney's charges or irregularities in the use of absentee ballots covered 50 typewritten pages, Caudle pointed out, adding "this means there is a great deal to be done; it will be some time before the probe is done.".—The Spartanburg Herald.
