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Honor Historian Patton

A reception is being held in Hendersonville this afternoon from 3 to 6 at the Bowen Hotel in honor of Mrs. Sadie Smathers Patton, member of the North Carolina Historical Commission, whose history, "The Story of Henderson County" has just come off the press. The reception is being given by the Hendersonville Woman's Club.

Impressive formal ceremonies accepting the book were held this morning at the court house at which time The County Commissioners accepted for the county; Mayor A. V. Edwards accepted for the City of Hendersonville; and addresses were made by visiting speakers.
