John Nelson Jackson, Sr., 89, passed away at 2 o'clock this morning after an illness of several years.

Funeral services will be held Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the McFarland Funeral Home. The body will be sent to Chattanooga for burial.

The deceased is survived by his widow, the former Miss Martha Ellen Hunter of Chattanooga, and the following children: Mrs. E. M. Walker of New York City, Mrs. David Dorroh of Black Mountain N. C., Mrs. Edward Grime of Hendersonville and Nelson Jackson, Jr. of Tryon; also five grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

Mr. Jackson was born April 27, 1858. He formerly lived in Chattanooga and came to Tryon 34 years ago and became a partner with his son in the firm of Jackson & Jackson. He had been in the textile business nearly all his business life. In Tryon he served as a vestryman in the Church of the Holy Cross, was the first treasurer and one of the organizers of St. Lukes Hospital; and a charter member and past president of the Tryon Kiwanis club.
