## Governor Scott Inaugurated Today In Raleigh, N. C.

On assuming his duties today noon, Governor Kerr Scott, said he faced the future with confidence; that high prices had reached their peak and we are now in a period of readjustment. He said he could not see the possibility of depression as bank deposits are insured against loss; Labor has more than trebled its average wage; farmers have support prices against below cost of production; reserve funds have accumulated for the aged and needy through the Social Security program and business has made profits during the past eight years.

He said during the war and later, neither labor nor materials were available and the State accumulated money but our public service needs increased and it is our job to wipe out this deficit. He proposed a 15-point program which included improvement and extension of roads; an increase in teachers salaries and the erection of adequate buildings and facilities; an improved health program; increased aid to the aged and indigent; conservation of our natural resources; improvement of public utilities to serve the farmers with phones and electricity; stimulation of more representative government; a referendum that will give the people more participation in making their laws; improving election laws; aid to veterans, labor, business and industry, personnel of state employees, giving more power to local governments. cooperate with federal government.
