## LIVESTOCK SCHOOL FOR POLK COUNTY

County Agent Paul Culberson has announced that a livestock school for all farmers and others interested in livestock improvement will be held on Tuesday, Jan. 31, at Columbus school, beginning

at 10 a. m.

Mr. Culberson says that farmers in Polk County are turning more and more to keeping livestock as a means of supplementing their incomes and maintaining soil fertility through the use of manure. This one day school is scheduled to give farmers more information on practical management of beef cattle, hogs, and sheep along with information on the outlook for profitable returns in livestock farming, and the control of diseases and parasites.

The program will include a review of the Polk County, livestock situation by Paul Culberson, Outlook Information by John Winfield of the N. C.
