The play opens Saturday at 8:15 p. m., and will be given 9 consecutive days and after that only on Wednesdays, Thursdays, Fridays, Saturdays, Sundays, giving the players Monday and Tuesday of each week for rest and relaxation. The event expects to bring thousands of visitors to Western North Carolina.
