Piedmont Scout Camp Opens

The 1951 season of Piedmont Boy Scout camp at Lake Lanier opened last week with a record enrollment for the summer. Some 125 Scout troops—numbering more than 2,000 Scouts and leaders are scheduled to attend camp this summer and some additional troops will perhaps be added as additional accommodations are being provided.

Numerous improvements and additional equipment has been added to make the camp bigger and better even than in previous years, and an excellent staff will be on hand to welcome and work with the large groups of Scouts and leaders attending the camp this summer.

While many on the camp staff this summer will be new in positions of leadership, all are Eagle Scouts and experienced campers at Piedmont Camp. Scout Executive R. M. Schiele will serve as camp director; A. C.
