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## Town Council Rejects Election Protest Claim

At a call meeting of the Tryon Town Council Thursday night Mayor C. D. Stevens, Commissioners Ernest Kerhulas, R. B. Scruggs and Ernest Tollison, and Town Manager C. O. Smith were present.

The question of the validity of the recent ABC election was taken up. Various Supreme Court decisions from the town attorney, J. Lee Lavender, were heard. He said, "It is my opinion that if no oath had been administered to any of the election officials the election would be valid, unless it shows that illegal votes were cast sufficient to change the result of the election."

The town minutes read in part: "This opinion was thoroughly discussed by the Commissioners and the motion was made by Commissioner Kerhulas that the legality of the election is valid according to the ruling of the Supreme Court as cited by the Town Attorney, and the protest made at 11 a. m., on October 4th attacking the legality of the election be denied. The motion was seconded by Commissioner R. B. Scruggs. After time for discussion the motion was offered and carried unanimously. There being no further business the meeting adjourned".
