## RAMSEY RITES TO BE HELD ON THURSDAY

Funeral services for Clyde Ramsey, 30, will be held Thursday at 2 p. m., at the Columbus Baptist Church. The body will lie in state for one hour prior to service.

The Rev. LeRoy D. Leppard of the Columbus Baptist Church; Evangelist Chester A. Hunnicutt of the Tryon Church of Christ, and the Rev. Bob Owens, Baptist minister, will officiate. Interment will be in the Columbus Baptist Church cemetery.

The Polk County Memorial Post of the American Legion will have charge of the burial services.
