## Woman Killed At Crossing

Mrs. Crowell Burgess was killed this morning about 9:07 when the 1941 Ford she was driving was hit by a Southern railway freight train at Gilbert's Crossing near the lumber plant at the city limits south of Landrum.

Her two daughters, Joan Burgess 11, and Margaret 9, riding with her were injured. Joan was taken to St. Luke's Hospital with serious head injuries and was still unconscious at noon. Margaret was taken to the home of her grandmother, near New Prospect, S. C. The mother's body was taken to Callahan Funeral Home in Spartanburg.

Mrs. Burgess was entering Landrum from the Chesnee road and attempted to cross the railroad to reach Highway 176. Young Margaret age 9, said it all happened so quickly that she didn't know anything except seeing the big train right on them.
