New Vision For Nurses At Hospital Here

Nurses at St. Luke's Hospital are now enjoying television, thanks to many friends of the hospital and to the Memorial Fund, in part.

Because of the friendly atmosphere and the sympathetic treatment on the part of our nursing staff, one of our patients made a gift to start a fund for the television set. Similar gifts flowed in and the fund became of sufficient size to warrant the purchase of the set at this time. The Board of Trustees of the hospital has supplied the remainder of the money from the hospital's Memorial Fund account.
