Weather Wednesday: High 78, low 48, Rel. Hum. 75 . . . One of the largest crowds ever to witness a street dance in Tryon turned out for the program Wednesday night. A report will be given later. Everyone seemed to have a good time while making money to pay for playground equipment at Tryon school. . . . The East Flat Rock elementary school was closed on Wednesday for a period of 7 to 10 days on account of four cases of diphtheria. Health authorities there say that there is no cause for alarm in other communities but that all children should be immunized as soon as possible. Mrs. Earl, the county health nurse, states there are a number of children in local schools who should be immunized . . . The new Dodge Cars will be out on October 23rd, according to headquarters. The cars will be restyled and half of them will have V-8 type engines. Price of one of the 10 new models will be cut more than five per cent and the price of four other models will be reduced slightly less than four per cent, three models will have the same price and two will have higher prices. Ned Anderson Opposes His Removal From Board

Local observers had predicted that Ned Anderson, chairman of the Polk County Board of Elections, would fight the order of the State Board of Elections removing him from office.

An Associated Press story from Raleigh in today's Asheville Citizen has a full column concerning the case. Through his attorney, R. L. Whitmire, Chairman Anderson, was granted a restraining order by Judge F. Don Phillips, who will review the State Board's record of the case at Burnsville on October 23, at 11 a. m.

In Anderson's petition to the court he asserted that he was "appointed for a two-year term, that the state board arbitrarily and summarily undertook to remove him from the office contrary to due process of law; that he had no notice of any charges against him; no opportunity to prepare a defense; no opportunity to be heard in opposition to any charges and that as the holder of the office he is entitled to the emoluments thereof and of which he has been deprived without due process of law."

Judge Phillips will decide the validity of Anderson's removal. In the meantime Anderson will continue to serve as chairman until October 23rd.

In an article in The Charlotte Observer, Attorney General McMullen is quoted as saying that in his opinion the State Board did not have the authority to do what it did in the manner in which it was done.
