## DOUGLAS S. BLOIS

Douglas S. Blois, secretary of Green River Mills was taken by death Thursday afternoon, April 16, after a lingering illness.

Mr. Blois was born in Savannah, Ga., Sept. 5, 1892, where he received his early education. His first business connections were in Jacksonville, Fla., where he met and later married Miss Pauline Burroughs on October 11, 1916.

In April 1917 Mr. Blois enlisted in the Army as a private. He served 18 months overseas and separated as captain in the Reserve.

Mr. and Mrs. Blois made their home in Tryon in 1924, where he was secretary and manager of the Ford Company for a number of years.
