Weather Tuesday: high 90, low 64, rain .80, Rel. Hum. 67 . . . Tornadoes in Michigan, Ohio and New England kill 205 people, 56 being in Massachusetts. Worcester area tornado worst since 1875. Over 350 people were treated in Worcester hospitals. Hundreds of homes were leveled and cars flattened and tossed about like toys. The Red Cross is asking for blood plasma for the storm victims . . . Armistice negotiators are having a recess in peace talks. Prospects for peace are brighter than ever. South Koreans don't want peace at the price the Reds ask. The Southerners want a united Korea first . . . Highways are being crowded now with people coming to the mountains and the lakes to cool off.
