Spartanburg County peach shipments will exceed Georgia's by about 300,000 bushels this year, Dr. M. J. Dorsey told visitors attending the Piedmont Peach Parade dinner on Tuesday night.

Mr. Dorsey, secretary and treasurer of the National Peach Council, base on his figures on a 28-state survey conducted this week.
