WAR IN KOREA ENDS TODAY, at 9 o'clock this morning to be exact. News of signing of the armistice was announced over television early Sunday night and about an hour later addresses were made by President Eisenhower, Secretary Dulles, General Van Fleet, United Nations leaders, and many others including news commentators; and a review of the entire struggle was reproduced in pictures. All within a few hours. Quite a contrast to the Battle of New Orleans which was fought many weeks after treaty was signed because of a lack of communication. All world leaders are hoping the armistice will lead to lasting peace and become a big step in convincing other nations that the days of aggression by force are over. The unification of all Korea and all Germany by peaceful means is underway . . . One of the most important meetings ever held in Tryon was that of the Blue Ridge Safety Council at the Tryon school auditorium Thursday night. Nearly 400 people from seven counties attended. J. E. Jeffries of the Standard Oil Co., Charlotte, gave a demonstration on fire prevention.
