## Whiskey Still Dynamited

Officers of the State Alcoholic Tax Unit in cooperation with Tryon ABC Officer Claude Scoggins destroyed an illicit distillery in the Little Mountain section between Landrum and Westbrook's store Wednesday morning.

The still was a steamer type with 200 gallon capacity. There were 69 barrels, 44 of them had been run off and 216 gallons of non-tax paid liquor was destroyed as well as the barrels of mash. Officer Scoggins said the barrels were placed deep in the ground and the officers had to blow them up with dynamite. A Chevrolet 2-ton truck was confiscated. No men were arrested. There were half a dozen officers on the raid hoping to catch the operators, for the place had been under observation for some time.

Mr. Oates is a member of the Scottish clans that settled around Fayetteville and when Lady Flora McLeod of Scotland visited that section a few weeks ago for a gathering of the clans, Mr. and Mrs. Oates entertained her in their home in Fayetteville.

The Spartanburg Herald reports that Sadie Collins of Landrum is a patient in General Hospital.

Mrs. Frederic W. Goddard, who left Tryon Sept. 27 to visit relatives in New York and Virginia was taken suddenly ill with paratyphoid and has been in the Germantown, Pa., hospital since Oct. 6. She is now reported out of danger but will not be able to return to Tryon until sometime in December.

ONE THING AND ANOTHER—

To prevent lumping, powdered sugar should be stored in a tightly covered glass container.

Lard or oil is preferable to butter for greasing pans; the salt in butter causes the butter to stick to the pan.

Jelly which has become sugary can be used to sweeten and flavor puddings or dried prunes, dried peaches or other fruits.

A coating of lemon juice prevents bananas, peaches and apples from discoloring after they have been sliced.

Lemons are juicier if heated before being squeezed.

A small amount of sugar added to olive oil will prevent it from becoming rancid.

Baking soda may be used to remove grease and discoloration from a waffle iron.
