Governor Jonathan Trumbull was the last Governor of the Colony of Connecticut, then the first Governor of the State of

Connecticut, serving from 1769-1784. He was the only Colonial governor to be so popular with the people that he served both under the Crown and under the new independent nation.

His son Jonathan was also Governor of Connecticut from 1797-1809. Another son, John, was the noted historical painter.

So TRUMBULL, please, not Turnbull!
