Tryon Firemen Can Be Paged

The Tryon Volunteer Fire Department is now equipped with pocket pagers ("beepers") according to Fire Chief Clarence Scoggins. The pagers were purchased for the Fire Department by the Town of Tryon and will replace the present system of fire phones.

In the past the Radio Dispatcher notified the Firemen of a fire call by a phone system of 20 simultaneous calls to all the Firemen, with the new pager system the Radio Dispatcher has the capability of notifying the Firemen either as a group or even individually. This new communications system will increase the speed and effectiveness to respond to fire calls as quickly as possible; therefore, reduce or eliminating property losses and risk to personal lives. Firemen will carry the pagers at all times.
