There is no official weather report for Thursday, but it was an ideal day. Friday morning was more of the same.

Federal officials made preparations Thursday to airlift homeless Cuban refugees to a "tent city" at Eglin Air Force Base and detained 25 immigrants suspected of being criminals in their homeland.

Soviet troops clashed with Afghan high school students last week that left at least 57 youths dead and hundreds injured according to reports.
