GREENS

Edible wild greens such as poke, dandelion and cress are sometimes bitter.

To remove the bitter taste, parboil the greens, drain them, and then return to the boiling water and cook until tender, recommend NCSU agricultural extension specialists.

Young and tender wild greens can also be used as salad greens, they add. Be sure to check them carefully and wash well.
