Today's fresh peach is large from Georgetown, Texas where and sweet, compared with the small, hard, hairy fruits that grew wild centuries ago, thanks to a half century of research by government and private botan-

According to specialists with sonville, Extended Care Facili- the North Carolina Agricultural Extension Service, the peach was among the first imported fruits to be grown in the United States.

It's believed that Spaniards sent the first seeds and trees to the New World with Columbus. By 1571 three types of peaches were growing in Mexico.

The peach spread so rapidly throughout the Americas that leading botanists in the middle 1700s taught that it was native to North America.
